

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

[SR Review] WMF Fusiontec Aromatic

Known for their heavy-duty cookware, WMF tried something a little different with the new Fusiontec range, combining the performance properties of copper, stainless steel, cast iron and aluminium. We were certainly intrigued by the new collection and decided to take their Fusiontec Aromatic pot for a test drive. Here's what we found.

The Fusiontec Aromatic was developed to provide the best possible results while cooking. The pot has quite some weight to it and comes with a condensation lid that's said to preserve up to 25% more cooking juices inside the pot, improving the quality of stews and roasts. The inside of the stainless steel lid has a knobbed surface that supposedly distributes the condensation more evenly over the food for intensified flavour.

While we can't say what percentage of the cooking juices were truly preserved, we did find that the pot retained heat and moisture particularly well while cooking even for prolonged periods of time, triumphing over other pots. The temperature was distributed evenly throughout the pot, which resulted in faster cooking and a very consistent flavour throughout the dishes.

While the heavy weight of the pot can be somewhat uncomfortable to handle, it speaks of the cookware's solid quality and is a minor inconvenience considering the delicious result.





Welcome to the garden

We've always had our eye on Cosentino's surfaces, but the brand's newest launch has us especially hooked. A limited-edition work by designer Colin Seah, the Garden Table draws inspiration from the outdoors, the surface crafted with the gorgeous Venetian stucco-inspired Kraftizen from Dekton. But the surface is not the most eye-catching part of this piece: at its core, a curved cut-out makes room for a large potted plant, turning the table into a literal sprouting garden. Yes, please!



The Brief

Living away from home can be freeing and exciting, but it can also unearth something less pleasant—homesickness. As the pandemic has made it particularly difficult to connect with loved ones across borders, many have had to grapple with this feeling, finding creative ways to build a home away from home.


It is then no surprise that this Vietnamese couple wanted to infuse their HDB flat with a touch of their home country. With the help of interior designer Vina Christine from Fifth Avenue Interior, they were able to materialise their aesthetic vision into a gorgeous abode that tells a story, incorporating Vietnamese furniture and exuding mid-century modern charm with a sense of nostalgia.

Rattan and green hues tie the look together across the various areas of the house—a boho-chic, Jungalow-inspired combination that balances out the sleek luxury of mid-century modern design. While the space is bold and eye-catching, it retains an understated, classic charm.

On the functional side, the flat underwent a floor-toceiling upgrade, including the removal of the service yard and storeroom, resulting in a spacious, open-concept kitchen. With a small child on board, extra storage space had to be allocated in various nooks and crannies to ensure plenty of room for the household's necessities.

After months of intensive renovation works, the young family was able to move into their dream abode, finally getting to cosy up in all of the home's inviting nooks and crannies.

Living and dining While a standard laminate feature wall would have been a suitable choice for a sleek and modern home, it would have felt forced and out of place in this cosy nest. The design team opted for a curved paint feature in a soft sage green tone from Nippon Paint instead, avoiding monotonous straight lines. In the dining area, the same shape is flipped upside down in the form of a recessed wall for some extra visual intrigue.



Little tots are always bumping into things, but you can reduce the chances of serious injuries by going with rounded corners and padded furnishings. It just so happens that curved walls and pillowy couches are hugely popular right now. Ideal for young family life.







ROAM FREE

If there's one thing kids need, it's lots of room to move about and explore. Creating boundary-free zones gives children confidence and also lets you have peace of mind knowing they are safe.

For this household with three kids, the parents' bedroom features a murphy bed, giving the family leeway to use this spot as a study, play or work area during the daytime. The fluted detail across the front ensures this space looks pretty whether the bed is up or down.



Space-saving and multi-functional furniture are always a boon when you have kids, ensuring adaptability, longevity and maximum use of space. Depending on your needs for the day, this height-adjustable table from Spaceman can function as a coffee table for when you have guests over, or you could use it as a dining table, a study desk for the kids, or even tuck it away.

We love the idea of these steps that can be stowed away, freeing up floor space for kids to roam while preventing them from climbing up the stairs while unattended.



GET CREATIVE WITH PAINT

Dings, stains and drawings all over your walls are going to be inevitable, but you can try some nifty painting tricks to avoid headaches.

If it's too much trouble to keep your kids from doodling on walls, try using chalkboard paint so the young ones can go to town and give you some downtime. Black isn't your only option, chalkboard paint also comes in brighter, fun options like green, dusky pink, blue and more.

Have a small room that needs to be shared? Create some visual separation by zoning with colour. You'll get all the benefits of an open space while maintaining focused areas for different activities.

5 TIPS FOR A NEAT & TIDY HOME

Hey Montgomery's Founder & Creative Director, Samantha Johnson, shares how to keep clutter under control even with messy young ones.

Make use of storage solutions

Storage is the number one topic our clients want to address. Most parents hate the sight of unsightly plastic monstrosities children tend to gather over the years. First things first, clear out and organise the toys your child actually uses and bless or sell the rest. Think about the end result, then buy storage that will fit the items. Label them well to help your kids find their toys and even more importantly, help the young ones put their things away. Measure your space, then select long-lasting and goodlooking storage options that are functional. Do also plan ahead. You don't want storage to fill up with rubbish when you can use the space for something else like a reading corner.

Create a kids zone

Ok, so no one wants their entire home to be filled with clutter as soon as they walk through the door—a little zen would be most welcome! Create a kids zone in your home, if you live on one storey, this could be your child's own space or a small area in the living room. If you live on more than one level, section off an area on each storey. Safely secure a simple, muted and low storage unit that you can use for organising toys, label and use it for your child's favourite toys of the moment. Add a forward-facing bookshelf above for child-friendly access.

Make use of stackable crates that can be moved around the home easily and rotate the toys. Over time, your child will learn that



their items are to be kept in those zones and will hover and play within those spaces, better still, after play time, they can help return and organise the items. Remember, everything should have a place, communicate this so the whole family can follow the lead daily.

Buy items thoughtfully

I know the urge to buy every "OMG I love it" thing you see when out browsing or online shopping. However, please don't impulse buy. You need to think of the overall vibe you are trying to achieve in your space then research and compare your options. Think about the mood, colours and the budget first before decorating your family or child's room, keep aside more budget for big ticket items such as beds and comfortable seating.





Disguise those cables

The cables that come along with the gadgets we have at home now can certainly be messy and hazardous when they are not properly hidden away from children. Think about your space functionally before you make a purchase and don't forget about the cables; how will they be hidden? Before buying furniture, think about their location against your electric points and ensure all your electrical items will reach the points easily with minimum cable clutter. It's best to plan ahead and think about how you'd cover those danger zones, instead of having to block the space with a makeshift or ugly item down the line.

Create the right atmosphere

Have you ever walked into a room and felt overwhelmed or, alternatively, calm and relaxed? Aim to give your child the best experience possible by helping them create a space that gives them everything they need to engage, play and relax. We all know how frustrating it can be when we can't find something. Children will enjoy their space more when they are able to understand where their precious doll is or that tiny car that always goes missing. A space is more than a place where things are kept, it is a sanctuary where children can play, feel safe and engage with their family. It's amazing what some thought and organisation can do for your child's well-being. With a little effort, your child's space could be inspiring.

TOP DESIGNERS REVEAL THEIR FAVOURITE RENOVATION PROJECTS AND THE THINGS THEY'VE GOT THEIR EYE ON THESE DAYS.

Interior designers work on countless projects throughout their careers and you can rest assured that they have their favourites. But what makes a project special enough to stand out among so many? We asked some of our favourite local designers to share the top rooms from their portfolios, alongside some of their go-to design tricks and current wishlist items.





KITCHEN

Designer Kelton Pek, Interior Designer from Versaform

Space Three-room resale condominium



What makes this kitchen a favourite of yours?

The kitchen island in this project integrates with the dining table, which eliminates the need for a separate dining area and saves the household extra space in the process.

What inspired the design?

The homeowners love cooking, which inspired us to give them an open-concept space to show off their cooking skills to friends and family.

What are some common design mistakes or missed opportunities you often notice in kitchen designs? Many kitchens don't incorporate enough enclosed cabinets, which limits the home's functional storage space. Make sure your kitchen has plenty of cabinets and minimise exposed displays and ledges.

What's your top tip for homeowners who like the look of an open-concept kitchen but are worried about cooking smells escaping?

Opt for a good exhaust hood and always open up the windows when you're cooking!

What's on your personal wishlist right now? A fully automated smart home.



BEDROOM

Designers Lead Designer Rashi and Designer Melissa from Home Philosophy

Space Condominium unit





BEFORE

The bedroom was perfectly fine and bright but lacked personality and didn't feel particularly cosy or restful.



AFTER

While the clients opted to retain existing cabinetry from the previous owners, the designers added a bold wallpaper behind the headboard to give the room an inviting and mysterious allure and then layered textures on the bed to imbue a greater sense of comfort.

What makes this bedroom a favourite and what works well here?

We love how this bedroom has a modern luxe feel, the colours and textures exude moodiness without feeling overly dark. The geometric wallpaper makes the space feel impactful while the carefully curated lights and furnishings pull the modern elements together.



What inspired the design?

Modern luxe design has many iterations, what our client wanted was a space that felt cosy without compromising on the look and feel of something that was modern and moody. We were inspired by Prohibition-era design which incorporates dim lighting, rich colours like blues and browns, and a focus on mixing of materials like velvet, leather, linen etc.

Notable learnings while working on this space?

Balance! Working with a bedroom to incorporate dark colours, without it feeling drab and overly dark, was definitely a challenge. We had to think closely about how to work with the other walls (choosing to paint them in a cream-tinged white) and the existing natural light to balance the aesthetic we wanted to achieve.

Top tips for designing a restful and stylish bedroom?

Work with different textures rather than colours! We love incorporating colour into our spaces, but in bedrooms we prefer to go with one or two key colours, keeping the rest of the palette neutral and then adding lots of textural variety to create visual interest.

Any missed opportunities or mistakes you often spot in bedrooms?

The bedhead wall is definitely a common missed opportunity! It's usually the main focus when you walk into the room, yet this is often either just left blank or paid very little attention to.

Advice for picking bedroom furnishings and decor?

Think about longevity and invest a little more especially in your bedding. Also, a particular colour or print can really make or break the look and feel of your bedroom.

What items are on your personal wishlist right now?

Comfortable armchairs that aren't bulky because these are so tricky to find!

Trends you're excited about?

We love modern art deco. It's always a good place to start for inspiration because there is so much to take in.

Trends you think should go away?

Scandi or grey- and white-themed homes.

DETAILS MATTER

To make your bed look extra comfy, layer on throws, pillows and cushions, and place a large basket or chair by the bedside to set them aside at night if you aren't using them (yes, some things can be purely decorative!). Go for a mix of materials, sheens and sizes for maximum interest.





What makes this dining room a favourite for you and what works well here?

The Crate Apartment has been *the* definitive project in UPSTRS_'s residential oeuvre; particularly in the way we transform interior spaces through spatial planning manoeuvres, and in the way we weave material narratives and the homeowners' personalities into the spaces.

We first gutted the entire apartment and inserted a wooden "crate" at the centre, creating a new living topology devoid of defined "rooms." Whilst the "crate" is the spatial anchor within this project; the dining "room" is the true heart of the home. It is a private space where the family gathers and also a social space to congregate when the family hosts and entertains. The 6.5 metre-long dining table at The Crate Apartment is particularly striking, encompassing a planning feat which now has become an integral part of our studio's design DNA.

My favourite details have to be the little nods to our collective cultural heritage. We inserted an old popiah



TAILOR-MADE

The home has been tailored to suit the lifestyle of a young urbanite family of three, with a shared passion for the film and broadcast industry, and for their family tradition of throwing homecooked popiah parties. board as part of a prep counter on one end of the dining table, neatly integrated within a Carrara marble top. Enclaved within the "crate" at the other end of the table are a pair of old film room doors, salvaged from the old Capitol Theatre, which was under major refurbishment during the same period of our design process.

Notable learnings while working on this space?

Two lessons were particularly enduring for this project:

Make use of limitations and challenges; or, when life throws you lemons, make lemonade. We were under immense budget constraints, and as a result, made full use of two core trades and resources that were at our disposal.

First was woodwork, which formed the core of our design intervention, and we envisioned a raw plywood inhabitable "crate" as the key spatial and material insertion. The second was masonry and wet works, and this lends a monochromatic backdrop surrounding the "crate," and in turn, undulates from the floor to form a sculptural dining table. This delineation of material and colour between the natural timber "crate" and the monochromatic "white space" around it has become something quite distinctive and memorable about the project.

2 A lesson in material and cultural sustainability; or, waste not, want not. I have to admit that half a decade on, I still marvel to myself at the fact that part of Singapore's cinematic and cultural history has been preserved and taken pride of place within someone's home! As designers, it's so easy for us to tear everything down and rebuild from scratch. But it can be so much more rewarding and meaningful when we are able to make use of what's discarded, unveiled, or retained, especially if they bear part of our personal or collective cultural history.

What is key would be balance; we want design to enable us to move forward and evolve, and not to let nostalgia and history hold us back or take over.

Top tips for designing a welcoming dining room?

I'll steer this conversation away from style, material, or decoration—these components tend to be subjective and personal. A few key pointers that I find universally helpful are:

• Promote workflow and social connections

The kitchen and dining space has much evolved to become not only the heart of the home but a highly social space within the home. Family and guests tend to gather around the host while food is prepared, and eventually shared at the dining table. As much as possible, we try to eliminate choke points and barriers



in our spatial planning between this flow. In the more compact apartments, we also encourage open, organic connections between the dining table and the living room. The seamlessness within the key social spaces in our homes tends to work very well with the way we live.

• Eliminate clutter

The dining table tends to accumulate clutter quite easily and quickly when we're not being too mindful of the way it's being planned and used. It's helpful to cater storage spaces close to it, and, where possible, carve out other dedicated spaces around the home for prolonged work purposes.

• Consider lighting

Lighting plays such an essential part of the dining experience—it should not feel over-lit and too interrogative, nor too dim and sleepy. Directing the lighting to illuminate the table and not over the seats is most key, and placing the lights on dimmer switches enables us to control the level of illumination to suit the occasion. This is especially helpful when the dining table is used for work purposes.


What items are on your personal wishlist right now?

Strange and exotic plants. Plants give life to any space, and I'm particularly drawn to species that have a fascinating form, texture and colour.

Additionally, I have such a soft spot for beautiful tableware, especially artisanal or handmade ones, and what I particularly love is that these beautifully made objects are meant to be shared, held and enjoyed by friends and loved ones around the dining table and become part of the most precious memories that we build and collect in our home.



INSPIRATION KIT



What makes this living room a favourite for you?

The integration with the kitchen and dining area provides flexibility for future space planning. This also allows the owners to enjoy casual conversations when family and friends are in the living room.

What inspired the design?

The inspiration came from several meetings and discussions with the owners. It's crucial to understand the clients' habits and lifestyles when designing an intimate living room. The inspiration also came from actively participating in the selection of furniture and getting to know the homeowners' preferences.

Notable learnings while working on this space?

Break the rules! It's not necessary to stay with the original space planning, plan the space by understanding the clients' habits.

Top tips for designing a living room for relaxing and entertaining?

Do not let the new space force the owners to change their lifestyle and habits but create a fresh environment that matches them perfectly. You only finalise the space planning after a mutual understanding has been reached. It's also important to keep the area's design theme similar to other parts of the house. Nevertheless, using different colour tones from soft to strong can create contrast and a homey feel. Styling should not be ignored as well—loose furniture such as rugs, curtains, plants and pillows can enhance the cosiness of the living room. Before purchasing a sofa, it's advisable to physically test its comfort.

We also recommend having two different curtain layers to cater for day and night use. For example, higher transparency curtains would be recommended for daytime use to allow sufficient natural light into the space.

For a living room conducive to entertaining, consider the space planning of the living room with zones that connect the owners to their guests during gatherings, like the kitchen, dining area and island. Lighting is also an element that creates a relaxing living room, simply by selecting a suitable colour temperature and brightness level. Hence, it's crucial to review the electrical plan and set up the necessary lighting based on the area's functionality to create different scenes within the space.

Any missed opportunities you often spot in communal spaces?

While sufficient storage is crucial, too much built-in furniture restricts future flexibility, so allocate storage in different locations if possible. If owners prefer buying furniture separately, it is advisable to keep in mind the design theme and check in with the engaged interior designer.

What items are on your personal wishlist right now?

Larger windows as I enjoy seeing the changes of nature, especially sunlight which affects the general atmosphere of a space. Natural light provides so much impact and creates surprises at different times. Besides, I also love the swaying shadows from trees by the window which lend the room poetry and whimsicality.


Trends you're excited about?

Textured walls such as limewashed surfaces. The rawness, as well as natural and organic texture, gives a sense of uniqueness.

Trends you think should go away?

Bulky, built-in storage.





INSPIRATION KIT



What makes this bathroom a favourite of yours and what inspired the design?

The porcelain feature wall tiles, which resemble antique Chinese ceramic pottery—that's the thing that inspired this design! The tiles are only used in the shower area, making it stand out from the rest of the space while still maintaining a soothing colour flow. I also love the amount of space in the bathroom, which allowed me to design a wider vanity area with two sinks.

Did you learn anything new from designing this space?

The layout of a bathroom is very important. In the original floorplan, the shower area was small as the WC was too close to the shower area. I resolved this issue by moving the WC nearer to the corner, as well as changing it to a wall-hung WC, making more space for the shower area.



Any tips for designing a great bathroom?

Provide sufficient space for storage and toilet accessories. This is important to prevent the bathroom from looking too cluttered and also give it that seamless finish. So many bathrooms don't have enough space to store toiletries, which means you have to resort to buying ready-made shelves, ruining the overall aesthetic of the space.

What are some common bathroom design mistakes?

There is often no proper segregation between the wet and dry areas. The choice of floor tiles also plays a part in this. Some tiles used for the bathroom floors are not suitable for wet areas, making them very slippery and dangerous for the household. Bathroom floors should also always have a slight gradient so that the water is able to flow to the drain and the floor can dry as quickly as possible.

Top advice for avoiding mould and mildew in the bathroom?

Most bathrooms only have a small window, which makes ventilation difficult, often leading to mould and mildew. One way to overcome this is to use Nippon Paint's anti-mould paint. Not only does it prevent the growth of mould and mildew in the bathroom, but it also saves you some money since you can bypass using extra tiles.



What makes this particular bathroom a favourite of yours?

We blurred the boundaries between indoors and outdoors, making natural elements accessible inside and playing with textures and materiality to achieve an intimate sanctuary.

What inspired this design?

The homeowners are extremely well-travelled. They particularly enjoy escaping the hustle and bustle of city life by retreating to luxury resorts. Wanting to incorporate that sense of lush tranquillity, we designed this bathroom to be villa-esque. As wood can sometimes look very rustic, we were also conscious of maintaining a level of refinement to exude luxury at the end of the day.

Can you share your top bathroom design tips?

We consider the overall mood that homeowners would like to achieve and the way they use the space. This includes ergonomics, like the height of the counter and sink, as well as carving out the wet and dry areas.

What are some common pitfalls of bathroom renovations?

The placement of fixtures, built-ins and sanitary wares often isn't planned carefully, which results in inconvenience. For instance, if the wet and dry areas aren't planned properly, the WC area will end up getting wet when you take a shower.

What items are on your personal wishlist right now?



Big Plans

Large but previously nondescript, this family home was refreshed to maximise style and comfort.

Offering up approximately 8,000sq ft of useable indoor and outdoor space as well as tall ceilings of about 3m to 3.6m, this resale home was full of potential. What it lacked was personality and polish. The terrace unit had been simply furnished, but the scant design features made the home feel somewhat unfinished and not particularly inviting nor functional for its new multigenerational family.

Starting with pretty much a blank slate, Richfield Integrated's Senior Designer Chris Cheang and Project Manager Yishan were tasked to give the space a modern-contemporary refresh. The duo gave the home a style boost by incorporating design moments throughout, including features like an eye-catching media wall with stone-look and fluted panels as well as gorgeous double glass doors that open up into the walk-in closet, making each space feel special while still being practical and comfortable for family life.

A unified colour scheme of grey, white and blue tones ensured seamless visual flow through the home, connecting the sizeable and disparate spaces to create an intimate environment. The same hues were also used outdoors, blurring the lines between interior and exterior spaces.

Owing to a prior bad experience with a contractor who worked on the family's previous property, the homeowners were understandably nervous about this renovation, but they didn't have to be. Even with supply and labour crunches due to Covid, Richfield Integrated not only met the projected completion date but even pulled off a makeover that surpassed the homeowners' expectations. Full of praise for the company, the family shared that the team not only presented plenty of ideas they hadn't thought of but was also meticulous and considered the finest details that tended to be overlooked. Additionally, the homeowners were thrilled with the workmanship and materials used, sharing that they were "all excellent and exceeded our expectations." Thanks to everyone's combined efforts, this home is finally rising to its potential, as it was meant to be.

Right Dining and kitchen

After repolishing the existing marble flooring, adding new light fixtures and repainting the ceiling, the dining and cooking zones were kept minimal to balance the strong hues of the existing wood panelled walls. Keeping the main area light also served to accentuate the volume of the space, which boasts 3.6m-tall ceilings.

They gave the walk-in closet a grand entrance, installing double glass doors that lead into the custom vanity area comprising a floating counter and a mirror encircled with lights.







A New Life

A modest 50-year-old flat gets a modern update for its new family.

Being one of the first flats to be built in Toa Payoh in the '70s, its basic design reflects the Housing & Development Board's then objectives to rapidly relocate residents en masse into high-rise flats during the country's formative years. Half a century later, however, the apartment's spartan layout is now dated and ill-adapted for modern living. Its small 670sq ft size, tight bedrooms and closed-concept layout separating the spaces by their respective functions give the apartment a stuffy atmosphere and pose spatial challenges to raising a well-bonded family.

New owner Roy Ng and his missus decided to update the apartment so it would better meet their young family's needs—they have two schoolgoing sons. They consulted Derrick Lim, Fook Han Rong and S. Kumar, design principal and project designers of D'Marvel Scale, and entrusted the renovation into their skilled hands. Besides the request to reconfigure the layout, the Ngs also relayed their desire for an island counter in the kitchen and mentioned the redundancy of a formal living room.

To create an open communal space that promotes interaction, the wall that enclosed the kitchen was hacked. With the kitchen now enjoined with the living room, the connected spaces form an expansive light-filled communal zone that maximises the apartment's full length. A clean-lined Japandi-inspired design language that was conceived visually enhances the volume of the home, defined by neutral hues like beech wood, dove greys and whites. The built-in storage unit was also designed for an elongating effect, by giving the concealed cabinets a seamless finish that effortlessly draws the eye down its entire length. The long magnetic strip light overhead further enhances the illusion of depth of the space.

An island countertop was installed in the middle of the communal zone, making it the centrepiece of the space. For added function, a shorter table extends from one end forming a dining table that can comfortably seat a party of five. This dining table is the family's main gathering hub, where parents and both sons come together to have meals, engage in conversation and watch their favourite TV programmes.

To optimise the limited space of the bedrooms, the decision was made to move the wardrobes outside the rooms. A shared walk-in wardrobe was created in a nook in between the facing bedrooms, with closets built along all three sides of its U-shaped layout. Inside the bedrooms, custom platform beds with pull-out drawers underneath were built. By keeping the cabinetry few and out of sight, the bedrooms maintain an uncluttered look whilst preserving more space for movement, play and rest.

Practical tweaks made to this outdated apartment have transformed it into a functional home for its new occupants, demonstrating that new life can be breathed into old concrete bones.





Custom Comfort

Nearly every space in this home has been tweaked to serve the unique needs of its occupants.

First-time homeowners Gary and Geraldine imagined their dream home to cater to their lifestyles to a T. It would have a spacious communal area so that they can enjoy their weekly game of mah-jong or pool with friends. It would also sport a pet-friendly design so that their two pet cats can roam freely whilst having their own dedicated space.

They conveyed their ideas and brief to Grace Chua, designer at Notion of W, who proceeded to sketch an outline of their vision. Besides the need for a pool table, there was also the request for an island countertop, a useful feature for baking and to act as an extra hang-out spot. As heavy cooking happens in this household, a more practical closed kitchen layout was also decided.

To create a free-flowing communal area, the kitchen and storeroom walls were demolished. The resulting living room is an expansive singular space, perfect for hosting large parties. A fixture of this fun-loving home, a pool table sits by the long end of the room—when games are not at play, a tabletop converts it into a dining table that can comfortably seat a party of eight. Facing this is the dry kitchen and island countertop. While the dry kitchen occupies the flat's original kitchen placement, the wet kitchen has been created in the service yard.

As the couple expressed their preference for industrial-inspired interiors, the colour and material palette of the home is ostensibly dominated by cool tones and raw, unpolished textures. The floors sport grainy woodtoned vinyl, the structural beams and column have been finished in coarse concrete, and the matte jet-black cable trunking and track lighting add a signature imprint of the industrial look.

The most striking feature of the apartment is the angled strip of flooring that starts near the main entrance, cuts across the apartment, and leads directly to the bedrooms. This angled feature is not mere aesthetic flourish, but highlights the angular reconfiguration of the bedroom corridor that simultaneously minimised the footprint of the cats' room and expanded both bathrooms.

With more space, more could be done within the bathrooms. After moving the washbasin from next to the WC to the adjacent wall, a larger shower could be accommodated in the common bathroom. Rarely found in HDB bathrooms due to the tight space, a bathtub now fits into the main bathroom whilst retaining enough room for the WC, vanity, and storage cabinets. Unsightly pipes and aircon trunking have been concealed behind a false wall behind the WC, which is also used to create some handy display niches.

The efforts to make this apartment more social and pet-friendly through spatial reconfiguration have paid off. The owners moved in with their furkids in December 2020 after a 4.5-month-long renovation.


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



1 Kitchen

The cooking space conveniently came with an open-plan layout but badly needed a refresh. Colin fitted the kitchen with generous cabinetry to boost functionality, integrating appliances to keep the counters clear and create a neater appearance. Additionally, he added an island to provide an extra spot for dining, meal prep and socialising. A rich navy hue was chosen for the builtins, adding modern flair to the space.

2 Bathroom

Deep grey stone-look tiles cladding the flooring and walls give rise to a cocooning and spa-like atmosphere. The natural vibes were then further accentuated with a floating vanity featuring woodgrain panels and woven baskets that fit perfectly underneath. For a pop of colour and contrast, a unique bowl sink with an oriental design was chosen specifically for this space and instantly perks up this private haven.

3 Bedroom

Cloaked in deep charcoal tones, the bedroom feels both relaxing and dramatic at the same time, with the stone-patterned closet flanking one side giving the sleeping quarters a more dynamic appearance. Pendant lamps and cove lighting elevate the mood, while the deep blue bedframe and drapes help unify the decor with the rest of the home.

4 Study

An adjacent room was combined with the main bedroom, creating a generous primary suite with a private office that's ideal for working from home. A fluted wall pretties up this utilitarian zone and performs a secondary function—it hides the entrance to the bathroom for a more visually pleasing productive space.
